F:(202)785-0261	fees by courts, state agencies, and local entities. Research shows that juvenile fees undermine the financial and psychological well-being of youth and their families. Given that, predictably, many of these families cannot afford the financial burden, harsh penalties for failure to pay juvenile fees lead to debt that only
www.atr.org	makes it harder for them to make ends meet and improve their circumstances.
	It is dangerous to have the criminal justice system view citizens as revenue opportunities. This creates a twisted incentive to keep people entangled in the system and funding it. In the case of Oregon's juvenile justice fees, the bottom line does not even make sense.
	Juvenile fees generate little or no net revenue for counties, courts, or the state. Across the board, revenue is declining while collection costs are substantial and increasing over time. In some cases, because families cannot afford to pay, collection costs exceed revenue.
	SB 422 will reform this failing, poorly-designed system that is not putting public safety first, and provide needed relief from fees for youth that aren't able to pay them, and their families that can't afford them.
	For these reasons, ATR urges you and your colleagues to vote yes on SB 422.
